Overture from *Don Giovanni*

In Mozart's re-telling of the Don Juan legend, the hero is ultimately dragged down to Hell by the statue of his murder victim – a terrifying scene evoked in the chilling opening bars of the Overture.

In quali eccessi, O Numi... Mi tradì quell'alma ingrata from *Don Giovanni* Helena Dix soprano

Seduced and abandoned by Don Giovanni, Elvira is intent on revenge, but she cannot subdue her feelings for him as she foresees his terrible downfall.

Mozart

Dalla sua pace la mia dipende from *Don Giovanni* **Christopher Turner** tenor

A masked man attempted to rape Donna Anna and then murdered her father; she has just realised that the perpetrator was Don Giovanni. In this aria her fiancé, Don Ottavio, promises to avenge her. His peace of mind depends on hers; he cannot be happy if Donna Anna is unhappy.

Mozart

Hai già vinta la causa!... Vedrò mentr'io sospiro from *Le nozze di Figaro* Julien Van Mellaerts baritone

The Count Almaviva is trying to seduce his wife's maid, Susanna, on the night of Susanna's wedding to his valet, Figaro. He has just discovered a plot to thwart his plans, and he is furious.

Parto, parto, ma tu, ben mio from *La clemenza di Tito* Catherine Carby mezzo soprano

Sesto (Sextus) loves the scheming Vitellia, who has ordered him to kill his friend, the virtuous Roman emperor Titus. In this aria Sextus is at first unwilling, but to placate her he will do whatever she wishes.

Mozart

O voto insano, atroce!... Vedrommi intorno l'ombra dolente from *Idomeneo* Christopher Turner tenor

In return for being rescued from a storm at sea, King Idomeneo had vowed to sacrifice to Neptune the first living creature he met on land. Tragically this was his son, Idamante. Regretting his terrible vow, Idomeneo imagines himself haunted by the grieving spirit of his dead son.

Mozart

O smania! O Furie!... D'Oreste, d'Aiace ho in seno i tormenti from *Idomeneo* Helena Dix soprano

Princess Elettra (Electra) had hoped to marry Idomeneo's son Idamante; seeing him betrothed to another, she gives vent to furious rage and suicidal despair.

Mozart

Soave sia il vento from Così fan tutte Helena Dix soprano Catherine Carby mezzo soprano Julien Van Mellaerts baritone

The sisters Fiordiligi and Dorabella, along with Don Alfonso, watch their soldier fiancés apparently sail off to war, as part of a plot devised by Alfonso to test the girls' fidelity. They pray for favourable winds and a calm sea.

Donizetti

Overture from *Don Pasquale*

This sparkling Overture sets the mood of Donizetti's comic opera, which deals with an irascible old man's doomed attempt to marry a high-spirited young wife.

Verdi

La donna è mobile from *Rigoletto* Christopher Turner tenor

'Women are inconstant as a feather on the breeze; if you trust them, you'll be sorry. Yet we can't live without their love.' So sings the Duke of Mantua in this aria from Verdi's *Rigoletto*.

Bellini

Casta diva from *Norma* Helena Dix soprano

The Druid High Priestess Norma calls on the chaste Moon Goddess to turn her unclouded face to the worshippers below, cool the ardour of fiery hearts, and spread her peace over the earth.

Oh! Di qual sei tu vittima from Norma
Helena Dix soprano
Catherine Carby mezzo soprano
Christopher Turner tenor

Norma (Helena Dix) has discovered that the father of her children, the Roman proconsul Pollione (Christopher Turner), is now in love with the priestess Adalgisa (Catherine Carby), who has asked to be released from her vows so that she can be with him. Norma tells Adalgisa that she is the victim of a cruel deception. Adalgisa is horrified; Pollione begs Norma not to reproach him.

Bellini

Or dove fuggo io mai?... Ah! Per sempre io ti perdei from I Puritani Julien Van Mellaerts baritone

Riccardo had been promised Elvira's hand in marriage, but discovers that she is marrying someone else. Distraught, he laments that he has lost the flower of his love for ever; his hopes are at an end.

Donizetti

Il segreto per esser felici (Ballata) from *Lucrezia Borgia* Catherine Carby mezzo soprano

Roman nobleman Maffio Orsini bids revellers at a party to live for the moment: 'The secret of happiness, whatever the weather, is to joke and drink and laugh at fools who worry about the future. We needn't care about tomorrow, but should just enjoy today.'

Bella figlia dell'amore from Rigoletto

Gilda (Helena Dix) believed that the Duke of Mantua (Christopher Turner) loved only her, but she looks on in horror – accompanied by her father, Rigoletto (Julien Van Mellaerts) – as the Duke turns his powers of seduction on Maddalena (Catherine Carby), a potential new conquest.
