## PHILIP MACKENZIE Conductor and narrator

Philip started learning the piano when he was 8 and the cello when he was 9. After taking a degree in music he went on to learn how to be A Conductor at the Royal College of Music in London.

When Philip grew up he discovered that being A Conductor is Brilliant! He has travelled all over the world, conducting orchestras in Russia, China, India, Singapore and South Africa. While he is travelling he likes to go exploring and sometimes he is introduced to all sorts of weirdly wonderful foods . . . Philip has been offered Roast

He has performed several times on radio and television, including a TV programme in which he taught Top Gear presenter James May how to conduct. ### MALCOLM FORBES-PECKHAM

#### Conductor and keys

Malcolm enjoys a varied career as a musical director, pianist educator in both the theatre and concert performance worlds. He is a graduate of the Royal Northern College of Music where his training included solo accompaniment and conducting. He is currently the conductor and Musical Director of the UK and International tour of the Lincoln Centre's award winning production of The King and I.



Theatre includes, as Musical Director/Assistant: Caroline or Change (Playhouse Theatre), A Christmas Carol (Royal Shakespeare Company), The King and I (London Palladium), Aladdin, Cinderella, Dick Whittington, Snow White (Bristol Hippodrome/Milton Keynes Theatre), Grand Hotel (Southwark Playhouse), Wonder.land (National Theatre/Theatre du Chatelet), A Pacifist's guide to the War on Cancer (National Theatre), The Braille Legacy, Emma; The Musical (UK Workshops). Malcolm was the pianist for the smash hit West End run of An American in Paris (Dominion Theatre). He is currently Associate Musical Director for Phantom of the Opera in the West End.

Other theatre work as pianist includes: West Side Story, On the Town (RNCM), Sweeney Todd (West Yorkshire Playhouse/Manchester Royal Exchange), Porgy and Bess (Regent's Park Open Air Theatre), Wind In The Willows (UK Tour), Titanic; The Musical (UK Tour), London Road (Movie Version).

Malcolm has given recent concerto performances at YB Chavan Centre (Mumbai) Exeter Cathedral, Cadogan Hall and Wells Cathedral, and has performed as a classical artist at venues including Bridgewater Hall, Wigmore Hall, Concertgebouw Amsterdam, The Forbidden City and Xi'an Concert Halls. He is also the assistant conductor of the Amadeus Orchestra and Mozart Symphony Orchestra.

In addition to conducting most of the Gilbert and Sullivan Operettas, as well as several Broadway Musicals, at the Everyman and Playhouse Theatres in Cheltenham and elsewhere, he has also taken his own Orchestra, as well as Brass Ensemble, to Cheltenham's twin town of Annecy in the Alps giving three or more successful concerts there during the course of each week. Twenty years ago he was elected a Councillor for the Borough of Cheltenham and, among his other duties, enjoys presenting the case for the Arts in this town.

#### JULIA DONALDSON Author

Julia Donaldson is the author of some of the world's best-loved children's books, including modern classics 'The Gruffalo' and 'The Gruffalo's Child', which together have sold over 17 million copies worldwide, and the hugely successful 'What the Ladybird Heard' adventures. Julia also writes fiction, including the Princess Mirror-Belle books illustrated by Lydia Monks, as well as poems, plays and songs – and her brilliant live shows are always in demand. She was Children's Laureate 2011-13 and has been honoured with a CBE for Services to Literature. Julia and her husband Malcolm divide their time between West Sussex and Edinburgh.

## AXEL SCHEFFLER Illustrator


Axel Scheffler is a star illustrator whose instantly recognisable, warm and witty illustrations have achieved worldwide acclaim and numerous awards. Axel is the illustrator of wonderful novelty, gift and poetry books for Macmillan, such as 'Fish Dream of Trees' (Two Hoots) and the bestselling 'The Bedtime Bear', 'The Tickle Book' and 'Mother Goose's Nursery Rhymes' – and of course, he is the illustrator of some of the world's best-loved picture books, including the modern classic 'The Gruffalo', with over 27 million books sold worldwide across the series. Axel's artwork is exhibited internationally; he has illustrated for many charities, and designed the Royal Mail Christmas stamps in 2012. Born in Hamburg, Axel now lives with his family in London.

#### THE GRUFFALO Music by Philip Mackenzie Words by Julia Donaldson Illustrations by Axel Scheffler

We all know the story of the Gruffalo (I hope!) – Julia Donaldson and Axel Scheffler's tale of the brave mouse meeting a monster from his own imagination and persuading it that he, the mouse, is the scariest creature in the woods. This new version came into composer Philip Mackenzie's mind a few years ago whilst reading the book to his then three year old son. Having conducted Peter and the wolf many times before, it struck him that the Gruffalo would fit perfectly with the other, more outlandish woodwind instruments.

Whereas Prokofiev used a flute for the bird, an oboe for the duck, a clarinet for the cat, the bassoon for the Grandfather, three horns for the wolf and the strings for brave master Peter, Mackenzie uses the piccolo for the mouse, the cor anglais for the snake, a small high pitched clarinet called the E flat for the fox, the contrabassoon for the Gruffalo and the horn for the owl. The strings represent the forest.

Listen out carefully at the end of the piece for the two mouse themes and the two Gruffalo themes fighting for supremacy in the orchestra. Which one wins?

## PADDINGTON BEAR'S FIRST CONCERT Herbert Chappell

Paddington Bear's First Concert was first performed by the London Chamber Orchestra with Ian Lavender (Pike from Dad's Army!) as narrator and Herbert Chappell (conductor) at a Teddy Bear's Concert at the Barbican in London on January 3<sup>rd</sup> 1986.

Paddington, the lovable bear from Peru with a talent for troubles and a taste for marmalade sandwiches is famous around the world but no more so than in the UK. Stories of his exploits have been translated into more than twenty languages and have recently been made into two highly successful films.

Michael Bond's story reminds us of Paddington's journey from Peru to the Portobello road in London and some of the friends he found there. It's climax is reached with Paddington's unscheduled appearance mid-symphony in one of London's finest concert halls. Herbert Chappell's witty and attractive music illustrated the story with great skill and imagination.



## THE SNOWMAN Howard Blake

Howard Blake composed the words and music of The Snowman in 1982, when an animated film was made of the story, using the drawings by Raymond Briggs that had already made his children's picture book a best seller. The film won many prizes too, and the music was released on CBS Records, on cassettes and on video, all of which have been enormously successful.

In 1985, Aled Jones recorded its famous song, Walking in the Air, which rose to number three in the hit parade and made him a household name. The Snowman has been performed by orchestras worldwide from Japan to Canada and elicited from the Independent the headline 'Knee-deep in Snowmen' and the astounding comment that "The Snowman has well-nigh frozen out Handel's Messiah as the nation's traditional Christmas fare."

What is its appeal? Christopher Palmer writing in March 1990 says: "...since we have seen many excellent products which have been and gone and failed to reach a wider audience, The Snowman must have something special, something which touches a popular nerve. Looking at it and its successor Granpa, it is not too difficult to see what the 'something' is. It is the voice of Innocence which has not been silenced or distorted by Experience but actually made more articulate by it..."
